



Lt. Col. Chris Mabis serves as the deputy commander for Atterbury-Muscatatuck Training Center's Muscatatuck Urban Training Complex at Butlerville, Indiana. He is also a student in the U.S. Army War College (USAWC) Class of 2019.

Lt. Col. Mabis began his military career as an enlisted Combat Engineer in 1989. He joined the Indiana Army National Guard as an Infantryman in 1992 and commissioned as an infantry officer in 1996 after graduating from Officer Candidate School. Prior to his current assignment, Lt. Col. Mabis commanded 1st Battalion, 151st Infantry – a battalion of the 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 25th Infantry Division – as part of the Associate Unit Program.

In addition, Lieutenant Colonel Mabis served as the Secretary of the General Staff for the Adjutant General-Indiana, Officer Strength Manager for the Recruiting and Retention Battalion of the Indiana Army National Guard, Infantry Rifle Company Executive Officer, Mortar Platoon Leader and Rifle Platoon Leader.

Lt. Col. Mabis holds a Master of Military Arts and Sciences from the School of Advanced Military Studies (SAMS) and a Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education from Indiana University Southeast.
